
## Home Fire Escape Planner



## Draw the layout of your home. Be sure to include:

- Doorways and windows in each room
- □ Smoke alarm locations (label "SA") \*Date of manufacture \_\_\_\_\_
- Carbon monoxide alarm location(s) (label "CO") \*Date of install
- Fire extinguisher location(s) (label "FE") \*Date last serviced \_\_\_\_\_
- Visit each room in your home:
- □ Find two ways out draw arrows on your plan

## Draw a separate floor plan for:


- $\hfill\square$  Basements,  $2^{nd}$  or  $3^{rd}$  floors, and/or finished room over garage
- Mark your safe meeting place on your plan:
- D Pick a permanent object not easily moved, such as a tree, mailbox, or light pole.
- □ Make sure the object is a safe distance away from your home.



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Close the door behind you as you escape.

Sleep with your bedroom door closed - it may save your life.

Doorways and windows should open easily to get outside.

During a fire, get low and go. When outside, stay outside.

Never stop to pick up anything on the way out.

Never go back into the home for any reason.

Call 9-1-1 from outside the home - know your address.

Make sure guest/visitors know your plan.



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
